## A Message from the Head Teacher

Welcome to 2018 at the Kimberley School. 2017 was a momentous year for our school and our community and we were, of course, delighted to see the hard work of staff and the talents of our great students recognised in the school performance tables and by our friends from Ofsted.

However, as 2017 drew to a close I was reminded that there is more to school than exam results by a number of events that took place during December. Many of you attended the wonderful performance of The Demon Headmaster and will have enjoyed seeing our students perform so well in front of a large audience.

The Christmas Music Concert was fabulous and it was the culmination of the fantastic work our Musician in Residence, Jodi Calder, is doing across the school to engage students in learning instruments and developing their performance skills. We have all really enjoyed the regular lunchtime concerts that Jodi and the students have been running and many of you will be aware of the increased opportunities students have had to take part in performances outside of school. If you would like to find out more about the opportunities for your child to learn an instrument or perform as part of an ensemble then please do contact Jodi through the school reception.

We also hosted our very first Sixth Form Celebration evening in the last week of term which took the form of a "mini" graduation ceremony. Students who left the sixth form in 2017 collected their certificates and there were a series of awards for individual students that recognised significant contributions or achievement. It really was a special evening and it is something that will become an annual event. Our intention is to run a similar event for Y11 students who complete their GCSE and equivalent qualifications this summer.

As you will see from the newsletter there are so many opportunities for students to participate in activities outside of the normal curriculum. As a school our aim is to get the balance right between outstanding exam success and wider personal development and throughout the newsletter you will get a real flavour of what is happening across the school.

However, our core purpose is academic progress and achievement. Staff across the school are continuing to work incredibly hard to ensure that all of their teaching, planning and assessment is focused on students achieving their Kimberley School Target in the new GCSE and A-Level qualifications. However, as ever, we will only be successful if we continue to work in partnership with home to secure good behaviour and attendance. Parents will be aware that we recently updated the behaviour policy to further strengthen our work on low level disruption. It also now sets out how any bullying can be reported and what action we will take when it is. Parents should also know that I am also currently working with governors on refining our attendance policy to ensure that it is in line with legislation and the Nottinghamshire Code of Practice. I am hoping to share this with parents before half term.

We are also looking at reviewing the information we give to parents about uniform and appearance. We do appreciate all of the work that you do to make sure your children follow these rules but we think we can help you do this even more by making sure that the rules are clear and easily interpreted. I will be writing to parents about this after the February half term.

Throughout all of our work we never lose sight of the importance of our partnership with home. We can only be successful because of the great children you send us and because of your continued support. I am looking forward to seeing what we can all achieve for our students and community in 2018.

Finally. Please don't forget that 12th February is an INSET Day. In the morning 6th form teachers will be attending a series of workshops and in the afternoon subjects will be working together to review and adjust their planning in the light of the significant changes to GCSEs and A-Levels. We do understand that INSET Days can be inconvenient but please do be reassured that they are always productive and are used to continuously improve the work we are doing.




We have to make sure that everyone is safe whilst participating in Physical Education and that is why it is imperative that students follow these basic rules:



# SENIOR MATHS CHALLENGE





The Senior Maths Challenge is a national mathematics competition aimed at 16-18 year olds, organised by the UK Mathematics Trust. The questions are specifically designed to stimulate students' mathematical problem solving skills. Students have 1 hour 30 minutes to answer as many of the 25 multiple choice questions as they can correctly; 4 marks are awarded for each correct answer but, to discourage students from guessing, they lose a mark for every incorrect answer.

Twenty three sixth form students took part in November and all performed to a high standard. 15 students did well enough to receive awards; 10 Bronze, 2 Silver and 3 Gold. Special mentions go to Greg Brown (Y13) and Tom Hall (Y12), achieving the highest mark in their year group. The exceptional performance of some students means they have qualified for the follow on rounds; well done to Ameila Morris (Y13), who has qualified for the Pink Kangaroo and to Ben Hatton (Y13) and Greg Brown (Y13), who have qualified for the British Maths Olympiad. Both the follow on rounds took place in December and we are awaiting the results.

Ben Newton (Y12), Tom Hall (Y12), Ben Hatton (Y13) and Greg Wallace (Y13) represented the school in The Senior Team Maths Challenge competition, organised by the UK Mathematics Trust and Further Maths Support Programme. They competed against 18 teams from other local schools in three rounds of mathematical challenges.

The first round is a group round where as a team they have 40 minutes to solve 10 challenging questions. In the second round they are split into pairs and have to complete a crossnumber (like a crossword), with one pair being given the across clues and the other the down clues;. The final round is a race against the clock to complete a mathematical relay, where answers get passed backwards and forwards between the pairs and, if they finish quickly enough, bonus points can be scored.






## **STEP BACK 69 YEARS!!**


