A Message from the Head Teacher

Kimberley Sixth Form - High Performance and an Exciting Future

In January the Department for Education published details of all secondary schools' and sixth form colleges' performance. Those of you who have had sight of this information will have noted the remarkable achievements of our sixth form students last year. In particular, the data showed us that in 2018 our students performed brilliantly when compared against other students from Nottinghamshire. In particular, out of 49 schools and colleges they were:

- 5th for the progress they made from their GCSE results;
- 1st for the progress they made in Applied Subjects;
- 2nd for the proportion of students gaining AAB or higher grades in facilitating subjects.

Nationally out of 4434 schools and colleges they were:

- 284th for progress they made from their GCSE results;
- 80th for progress they made in Applied Subjects;
- 296th for the proportion of students gaining AAB or higher grades in facilitating subjects

As the contents of this newsletter reminds us, there is much more to the Kimberley School than exam results. However, I am sure that you will be as proud as I am of our students' achievements last year.

Our Sixth Form enjoys a strong reputation for high academic achievement, strong pastoral support and personal development. We have now secured funding and planning permission for a brand new, £1 million sixth form centre that is scheduled to be completed during the 2019-2020 academic year. This combination of high academic achievement and state of the art facilities will mean that the community of Kimberley School and beyond will have access to the outstanding sixth form provision that it deserves. This is an exciting time to be a part of this school and its community. 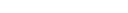


Leading up to the final part of the calendar year, our Year 11 students were rewarded for their excellence across the curriculum and for their performance as senior pupils in the school.

The Leavers' Certificate & Awards Evening

On Wednesday 19th December we held our second Certificate and Awards Evening for the students who left us last summer at the end of their Year 13. We invited the students back, with their parents/carers and all students received their exam certificates. There were also subject awards and special awards for outstanding achievement and contribution to the school. It was a really lovely event and very well attended. Janet and Steve Barker, parents of Emily Barker, a previous Head Girl, who sadly died of bone cancer 3 years ago aged 22, came to the evening and presented The Emily Barker Award. This is an award to recognise someone who, throughout their time in school has shown a love of learning and who staff believe will go on to touch many people's lives. The award this year went to Eleanor Knapton who is studying to be a primary school teacher. Janet Barker also thanked the ex-students for all their charity work for the Bone Cancer Research Trust and explained how the money raised is used. The feedback from our lovely ex-students and their families about the evening was very positive, so we look forward to repeating the event next year.

Outside Visitors

This term we have already welcomed the organisation, 'Think for the Future' into school twice, giving talks on 'Money Matters' and 'Positive Mindsets' to our 6th Formers. This term also saw the return of Mr Keith Sudbury who raises awareness of the need for blood donors and donors of bone marrow as part of the Anthony Nolan Trust. Following this moving presentation, several students gave up their own time to attend a recruitment session and to be registered with the Anthony Nolan Trust. Later in the term we are welcoming both the University of Nottingham and University of Cambridge into school to talk to students about areas of student life. We also continue to welcome the Careers Service in to school to work with the 6th Form on an individual basis as well as to run apprenticeship workshops for both Year 12 and 13 students. The work they do on apprenticeships has been complemented by visits from ex students who are now involved with successful apprenticeship programmes. We were also very fortunate to have a workshop for Year 13 students run by Rolls Royce, explaining the types of apprenticeships available to students who gain excellent A levels but don't feel university is the best route forward. As a result of the talk some of our students have applied for apprenticeships at the company.



Career Thinking

On Jan 8th our Work Experience programme was launched to Year 12s. All Year 12 students partake in a week of Work Experience either in July or in February depending on their courses. Year 13s spoke about their experiences and Year 12s are now busy writing letters to companies and organisations. SIXTHI FORM

Alongside various trips within the local area sixth formers have already ventured outside of the UK in 2019. Mr Wharmby and Miss Fletcher took the ever popular annual trip to Krakov early in January and one of the Year 12s in the party, Faith Banks, has very kindly written about her experience on the trip.

On the 10th January, I flew out to Krakow, Poland along with 15 other History and RE students in Years 12 and 13. We arrived around 1pm in Poland, and immediately it was so beautiful as there was about 2 inches of snow on the ground - completely different to the slightly warm Nottingham we had flown from.

We started the trip by taking a walk around the Jewish Quarter, with a tour guide who told us all about life for the Jews during the war, as well as showing us areas shown in Steven Spielberg's 1993 film Schindler's List. She told us about different Jewish traditions and events, before we visited a synagogue in the square. After learning more about the Jewish religion itself, we went to the museum of Oskar Schindler's factory, where we learnt more about the movement of Jews into ghettos, and the incredible work of Oskar Schindler, who saved 1,200 Jews during the War.

On the second day, we visited Auschwitz1 and Auschwitz - Birkenau. At a time so close to the Holocaust Memorial Day, it was already a time in which we were all thinking about the horrible events that had taken place here. We visited Auschwitz first where we saw the collections of confiscated possessions of the victims, such as suitcases and shoes. It was absolutely heartbreaking, but insightful into the powers of destructive authority. The hardest part was seeing the belongings of young children, who we learnt rarely survived due to their inability to provide the work that the Nazis wanted. On the way to Auschwitz

II - Birkenau, the air dropped a lot colder, and I hadn't noticed how much snow there was until we were in the open spaces there. We walked around the site, seeing the remains of the gas chambers and entering the wooden barracks where prisoners slept. The snow made the experience more real, for we were all freezing when in multiple layers of warm clothes - and the people in the airy barracks had nothing but thin pyjamas to keep them warm. It was an eye-opening experience that made the events that took place here come to life in front of us. I found it hard to stomach the thoughts of what had happened in the Second World War and how evil people can truly be.

On the final day, we learnt more about Krakow's history, visiting the Salt Mines and being given a tour of the beautifully crafted underground space - 130 metres below the surface! We walked through the Chapel of St. Kinga, which was stunning, with everything crafted out of salt, even the chandeliers. After the salt mines, we were given some time to explore the square, and even heard the Pied Piper playing from his spot there.

Overall, Poland was a once in a lifetime experience. Everyone we went with was respectful and open to learning, and we even found time to have some funplaying bowling in the hotel just before we returned home. Thank you to Mr Wharmby and Miss Fletcher, who organised the trip and ensured we had a safe and amazing experience whilst we were there. I'm incredibly grateful to have had the opportunity to learn about the different cultures and the importance of love, respect and equality in the world - no matter gender, race, religion or age. It showed me how important it is that we stop prejudice in the world, and I will carry the lessons I learnt there for a long time.

ast summer, for a whole week in July, 39 students from Years **L**9 - 12 went on a study visit to Munich in Southern Germany. On the outward journey (Tuesday night - Wednesday), we watched a film about the Munich student, Sophie Scholl, and the White Rose resistance group, who would be a major focus for us the next day. We stayed in a tranquil suburb called Thalkirchen in a youth hostel rated the best in Germany, next to the river Isar and Munich's zoo. Many in the group had football glory on their mind, as England were to play a World Cup semifinal for the first time since 1990 that Wednesday evening. We took a walk down by the wide, shallow and rushing pale green river, settled the nerves by saying a prayer in the small and beautiful church of St. Maria, whose bells would rouse us the next five mornings, and enjoyed a pre-match meal together... but it was not to be. Mandzukic, possibly the worst player on the pitch, won the game for Croatia.

hursday it was down to our own business. First stop was Munich's Palace of Justice and its memorial room to the White Rose activists. We also saw the location of the court room where the screaming Nazi judge Roland Freisler passed the death sentence on Sophie Scholl and others, whose 'crime' was to resist Hitler mainly by secretly printing and distributing a series of leaflets documenting the evil impact of the Nazi war effort and urging the German population to come to their senses. We made the short trip to the newly constructed and recently opened Documentation Centre for the History of National Socialism, where we had talks and tours with Dr Ulrike Ehret and colleagues. This centre is on the site of the former Nazi HQ in Munich, the 'Brown House'. Next door is the former Führerbau building (very much as it was and recycled into a prestigious music school), where Hitler, Chamberlain, Mussolini et al signed the Munich Agreement in 1938. In front of these buildings, the students were struck by the Temples of Honour,

now dismantled and overgrown, where the 'blood martyrs' of the failed Munich Putsch were buried and commemorated. The German academics were greatly impressed with our students; we had learned a lot and left for lunch in and around the Marienplatz and Viktualienmarkt.

We zipped up to the main building of Munich's Ludwig Maximilian University to see the atrium where Sophie and her brother Hans Scholl had dropped the fatal leaflets in February 1943, imploring the German population not to go along with Hitler's war effort. Both were arrested on the spot, interrogated by the Gestapo and – after a show trial where they scored many points against Roland Freisler – executed, along with their friend Christoph Probst. It was quite something to stand in the very atrium where this courageous act of resistance – one of many – had taken place; this location was used for the feature film we had seen just the day before. We were amongst the first visitors to a new and extended information centre about the White Rose group, just beyond the open entrance hall.

Our final stop for the day was the Allianz-Arena, home of 1. FC Bayern München. We first had our full tour of the stadium with some mind-blowing statistics as to the scientific and technical achievement of this ultra-modern stadium, visits to the changing rooms, press conference areas and even the tunnel, where we walked onto the pitch to the tune of the Champions League music. Our guide revealed himself to be half-Croatian at the end of the tour, and expressed sympathy with England for the defeat the night before. He really hoped his countrymen could now go all the way for this would be great for the confidence of the new Croatia.



Ulli Hoeneß, president of Bayern Munich football club, has promoted a philosophy which gives wheelchair users, for example, one of the best views in the stadium, and offers good seats at low prices for fans on ordinary wages whilst absolutely clobbering the corporate guests. It was a huge shock for the whole of Germany when Hoeneß was convicted of tax evasion in 2013; he spent some time in Landsberg Prison but was re-elected as the club's president in 2016. Hoeneß was tried in the same court house as Sophie Scholl and served time in the same prison as Adolf Hitler. Small world.

We entered the Bayern Munich museum — an array of installations, displays, photo opportunities — and emerged in the club shop, where a few members of the group blew their budget on shirts, training kits, scarves, slippers, caps... who knows. As we left and made our way back to the coach, it was rumoured that a couple of our boys had been scouted and had signed for Bayern. They had all the right kit, at least. Back at base, an impromptu football match developed in the park next to the youth hostel.

riday was an early start for the drive south to the Alps and the very pretty market town of Berchtesgaden. En route we watched a documentary about the local people, many of whom were displaced and forced to sell their homes to the Nazis in the 1920s and 30s. Hitler had first come here on holiday in the 1920s, staying in a mountain chalet just outside the town called Haus Wachenfeld, and had taken rather a shine to the place. We arrived in time to take in the clean, crisp air of Berchtesgaden, explore the narrow streets and quaint sights, and buy an early hot lunch at our leisure. At midday, expert local guide Tom joined us on our coach and guided us up and around the Obersalzberg, an especially picturesque mountain side which the Nazis had made their second power base in World War Two. Hitler, Göring, Bormann and Speer all had luxury homes here, and the mountain is still riddled with bunkers and escape tunnels. We drove past Tom's own house, originally part of a settlement for SS officers and their families, then pulled up at the famous Hotel zum Türken. From here we walked down to the site of Hitler's house, the Berghof (once the humble Haus Wachenfeld, which he had acquired and vastly extended), where he spent so much time and entertained so many foreign heads of state and diplomats. Very little remains of the Berghof but from the pictures and plans it is easy to know you are standing in the large front room, enjoying the same panoramic view through the mountains towards Salzburg... The best was yet to come as we then made the spectacular ascent, by special bus and then a lift up the centre of the mountain, to the Kehlsteinhaus, or Eagle's Nest, as it has become known. This was Hitler's tea house on the top of a mountain, famously seen being liberated in Band of Brothers. It was given to him by the Nazis as a 50th birthday present but it is thought that he only went up there a dozen or so times. The tea house building itself is very much as it was, you can see the red marble fireplace given to Hitler by Mussolini, and at 1,834 metres above sea level, the views here over Austria and Southern Germany are breathtaking. After snacks, ice creams and many photos, and further bulletins from Tom, we began the descent. On our own coach again, we wound down to the centre of Berchtesgaden to Tom's car, as he concluded his potted and slightly grizzly histories of the leading Nazis whose presence still haunts this tiny corner of Germany. We finished our long day with a cold supper back in Munich.


