

16-19 Tuition Funding Statement 2021-2022

What is the 16-19 Tuition Fund?

The 16 to 19 tuition fund was allocated for the 2021 to 2022 academic year. It was ring-fenced funding for schools, colleges and other 16 to 19 providers to mitigate the disruption to learning arising from coronavirus (COVID-19).

The funding was provided to support small-group tuition for 16 to 19 students. Although the actual tuition does not need to be for GCSE English or maths, the students supported all need to be those who had not achieved grade 4 or above in at least one of those subjects at this level by age 16.

How will The Kimberley School use the 16-19 Tuition Fund?

Kimberley School received £6,113 which was spent in the following ways:

- Intervention work after Christmas 2022, to catch up students who were disadvantaged by inconsistent teaching of A-level Sociology during the school lock down and Autumn Term. Small group revision sessions with experienced teacher.
- £354 – intervention for Year 13 Psychology students prior to the final exams with a graduate Psychology student.
- £2695 – intervention with students at risk of failing to secure progression from sixth form. One-to-one discussion of apprenticeship routes and guidance for university applications including course selection and personal statements.

Support sessions were prioritised for the following students who meet the criteria:

- Students who have achieved a grade 5 or below in maths and/or English at GCSE
- Ensure the needs of SEND students, particularly where they have experienced additional disruption to learning as a result of their specific needs and disabilities, were taken into account.

Our Commitment:

We are committed to ensuring the tuition fund is used in accordance with the Government guidance. We have:

- recorded the use of the funding, including reference to the individual students that received the support, the needs of those students, and the number of hours of tuition delivered.
- delivered the extra tuition and spent the associated funding in the 2021 to 2022 academic year
