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


A group of Year 10 students attended a 'Medical Careers Dav' at the West Nottinghamshire College Campus on the 28th March. interest

News(a) Kimberley

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Wow. What a year. Schools are relentlessly challenging and exciting places and it has been another interesting year at Kimberley. Shining through everything we do are our wonderful students and throughout this newsletter you will see countless examples of their fantastic achievements and how they are developing the wider personal attributes that they will need to lead successful adult lives. At Kimberley we strive to get the balance right between enabling students to achieve superb exam results and wider personal development and this newsletter once again demonstrates how we are managing to achieve this.

It is a funny time of year working in a school. We are gearing up to accept a new cohort of students into Year 7 for September. Staff across the school are turning their minds to this new cohort and are trying to learn as much as they can about them so that they can plan a successful transition. At the same time, they are working with Year 11,12 and 13 students to support them through during the very challenging exam season. Final conversations are taking place with Year 11 and 13 students to ensure that they have secured appropriate post-16 and post-18 pathways for next year.

This is also a time when staff start to plan ahead for the new year. Subject teams will use the time between now and the end of term to make changes to their schemes of work and resources so that they can ensure that everything is in place next year so that teachers can plan sequences of learning that enable all students to remain on track to achieve their Kimberley School Target. The two INSET days on the 25th and 26th June will be invaluable to subjects as they work together to adjust schemes of work in line with their developing understanding of the new GCSE and A-Level courses.

Senior Leaders are also planning to start ahead for next year. We have introduced many significant changes in how the school works since September 2016 and our priority remains to embed these developments. However, in addition to this in the next academic year we will continuing to improve how we work including:

- Introducing a "smart card" to help us enforce the new uniform policy
- Strengthening our work with students who join us with low literacy levels by introducing the very successful Hackney Literacy Project
- Participating in the Nottinghamshire Mental Health Services and Schools Link pilot project so that we can strengthen our work in providing timely mental health support to our students
- Developing our programme of careers education in line with the governments' new careers strategy for schools
- Embedding the recent improvements, we have made in recognising and rewarding achievement through our new IMPACT strategy
- Participating in the Department for Education's Basic Maths Premium pilot project in order to provide more support for students who do not achieve a standard pass (Grade 4) in maths by the end of Year 11.
- Continuing to do refine and improve our work in accelerating the progress of high ability students across the school.

Nothing stands still at Kimberley school. We are continuing to do all that we can to make this the best place for youngsters in our community to grow up, learn and prepare themselves for a successful future. As is the case for all public services we are having to do this in an increasingly challenging financial landscape. The governors, staff and myself all appreciate and value the support of parents and carers as we strive to make this great school even better.



NUREMBERG

Germany School Trip January 26th – 29th 2018

A large group of Year 11 students recently made a four-day visit to the beautiful German city of Nuremberg. It is quite a short flight to Nuremberg and the airport lies close to the Old Town which was all very handy. The youth hostel on this trip was the coolest accomodation ever and actually part of the Kaiserburg (imperial castle) with amazing views over the Old Town.

Saturday's theme was National Socialism. We stopped at the main market square, scene of the world's most famous Christmas market one month earlier. The square had been renamed 'Adolf Hitler Platz' from 1933 to 1945, then used local transport to reach the former Nazi Party Rally Grounds. These are on the south-east side of Nuremberg with their 'Great Road' pointing north westwards in a direct line towards the imperial castle, our home from home.

We crossed much of this vast expanse of land, peppered with information boards about what was and what might have been in the Thousand Year Reich, to the main grandstand on the Zeppelin Field. The central part of the grandstand is still intact, complete with the only surviving lectern used by Hitler. It is a bizarre and chilling sensation to stand on the very spot where he addressed the masses assembled on the vast meadow below. We did this only after some fans of an East German football team called 'Energie Cottbus' had moved away; they were in town - and very early - for a fixture against 1. FC Nürnberg at their stadium, itself a former Hitler Youth stadium a few yards away, but their drunken antics and right-wing rhetoric made for a depressing and unsettling experience.

We were grateful to get back to the Congress Hall, the gargantuan yet unfinished Nazi building which now houses a museum and exhibition all about the Third Reich. We could experience this at our own pace taking in short films, displays, pictures and text with the help of a hand-held audio guide.

After lunch we continued our tour in the Luitpold Grove and Arena, another expanse of parkland with a wealth of historical associations. Here too there are plenty of information boards in German and English with pictures from the Third Reich period. As visible as ever is the Hall of Honour, originally a monument to the fallen of World War One, then an integral part of Hitler's party rituals and now a monument to all victims of war. We walked across the Grove to the remains of another grandstand and then to the steps of the old Luitpold Hall, infamous as the place where the murderous Nuremberg Laws on racial purity were proclaimed



in 1935.

The group then returned to the centre of Nuremberg, its picturesque old town, and enjoyed free time shopping and eating. We arranged to meet back at base for our evening meal. It was an easy meeting point, due north and visible from almost anywhere in the old town.

After so much sinister history we needed some high-quality entertainment! On Saturday evening we were privileged to see a fantastic performance of the opera 'Carmen' in the Staatstheater. It had been a long but very fulfilling day in Nuremberg.

Ounday's theme was Justice and first call was the house of the Nuremberg Trials. This is still a working courthouse but mainly a museum - specifically about the Nuremberg (main and other) trials which were set up after World War Two. There is also much about other more recent genocides like those in Yugoslavia and Rwanda and the work of the International Criminal Court. This was also a self-guided tour with English audio guide if required, and a work sheet. We saw exactly where leading Nazis like Göring, Hess and Speer were brought to justice, before the world, in 1945-46. The prison where they were held and the gymnasium where 10 of the accused were hanged are no longer there but standing in the very room where the drama of the trials took place is quite an experience. This museum is not only interesting for history students but also prospective law students, as the Nuremberg Trials were a major event in the history of war crimes legislation. For linguists too, these trials marked the birth of simultaneous translation - just about everything that was said had to be understood in French, German, English and Russian.

We returned to the centre of town for lunch and visited the Street of Human Rights with its striking gateway and collection of columns running down the middle of the road, a tribute to the 1948 Declaration of Human Rights. Nuremberg has done so much to reinvent itself and become a champion of Justice in the modern world. Adjacent to this is the Germanisches Nationalmuseum, where we had the chance to see a most diverse range of exhibits including the oldest globe in the world. After our evening meal we travelled out of the city centre to a swimming paradise

known as 'Kristall Palm Beach', an exclusively indoor experience at this time of year. This provided a most welcome distraction with its amazing slides, rapids, jacuzzis and host of pools!

Modieval Nuremberg. After packing and leaving our luggage in a secure room at the youth hostel, we went into the main castle itself. We saw the long and complex history of the castle condensed into a 15 minute animation, went into the main palace and chapel with countless

to great lengths to create optimal conditions for preserving the art work, experts at the Germanisches Nationalmuseum recommended a temperature of 18° C be maintained in the art bunker so all manner of heating systems and regulatory devices were installed, walls and ceilings were covered with several layers of insulation. The bunker was



exhibits, glimpsed a permanent exhibition on the history of warfare, climbed the Sinwell Tower and visited the Deep Well, all in an hour! From the top of the tower, you can see on a clear day the Rally Grounds we visited two days earlier. Today, we could almost peer into our bedrooms in the youth hostel next door.

One last appointment remained – the historic art bunker, a remarkable place brilliantly brought to life by our expert guides. The bunker was specially chosen to protect art as it was easily accessible from the road and had a natural slope rather than steps, making it particularly handy when bringing in large items. The officials went

permanently staffed by a crew of four men, for 48 hours at a time, they had a toilet and a day room with a Volksempfänger radio. We also learned about the war-time bombing of Nuremberg (91% destroyed, second only to Dresden (92%)) and how the surviving population dealt with the aftermath of World War Two (Nuremberg had enough rubble to fill the Great Pyramid of Giza, for example), and what you see today is stunningly beautiful but it is basically a replica, a 're-build.' One fascinating 'thread' is the so-called 'Imperial Regalia' as they are properly known in English (German: Reichskleinodien), which are kind of like the Crown Jewels of the Holy Roman Empire. These were committed to Nuremberg in







1423 by the Emperor Sigismund – this seems only right, given that Nuremberg had become the Empire's 'unofficial capital'. They stayed there for centuries but to keep them well away from the roving French they were moved to Regensburg in 1796 and Vienna in 1800. After the Anschluss of Austria in 1938 Hitler decreed that the Imperial Regalia be returned to Nuremberg, where they were exhibited in the Katharinenkirche. In WW2 they were stored in many places (and there are stories of them being moved from place to place by bicycle!) including to this very bunker. In 1945 the jewels were found by US soldiers and taken back to Vienna - one can well understand the desire to deliver this slap in the face to Hitler but in all honesty, if we can just ignore Hitler for a minute, the Imperial Regalia should reside in Nuremberg, shouldn't they?

And finally we all went for a traditional meal together in the Barfüßer beer hall where our students were free to order from various dishes such as sausages, steak, pork shoulder, sauerkraut, fried potatoes, dumplings, chicken, salad, ice cream etc. Nuremberg sausages (Nürnberger) are so small that 8 or 10 of them constitute a normal portion. Many centuries ago when large parts of the population were affected by the plague, charitable people determined to feed them would make sausages small enough to thread through their keyholes, thus avoiding direct contact and infection; the plague has gone but the finger-like sausages remain.

We collected our things and made our way back to the nearby airport, eventually getting back to school in the early hours of Tuesday morning.



This was a highly educative trip with striking curriculum links to GCSE and A level history and German, and of great general interest too.
