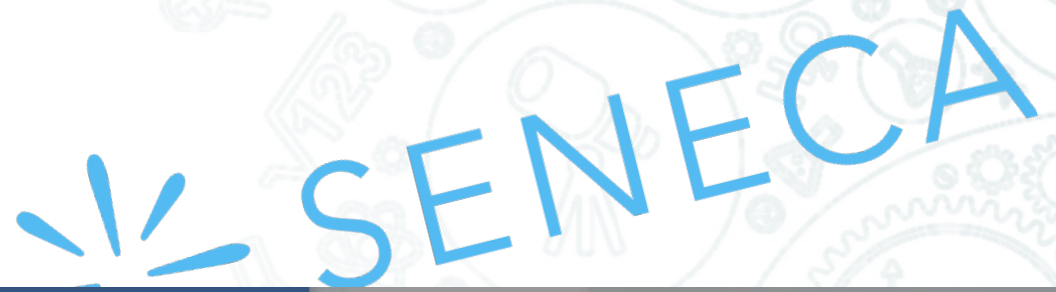


Useful YouTube'ing

Mathematics

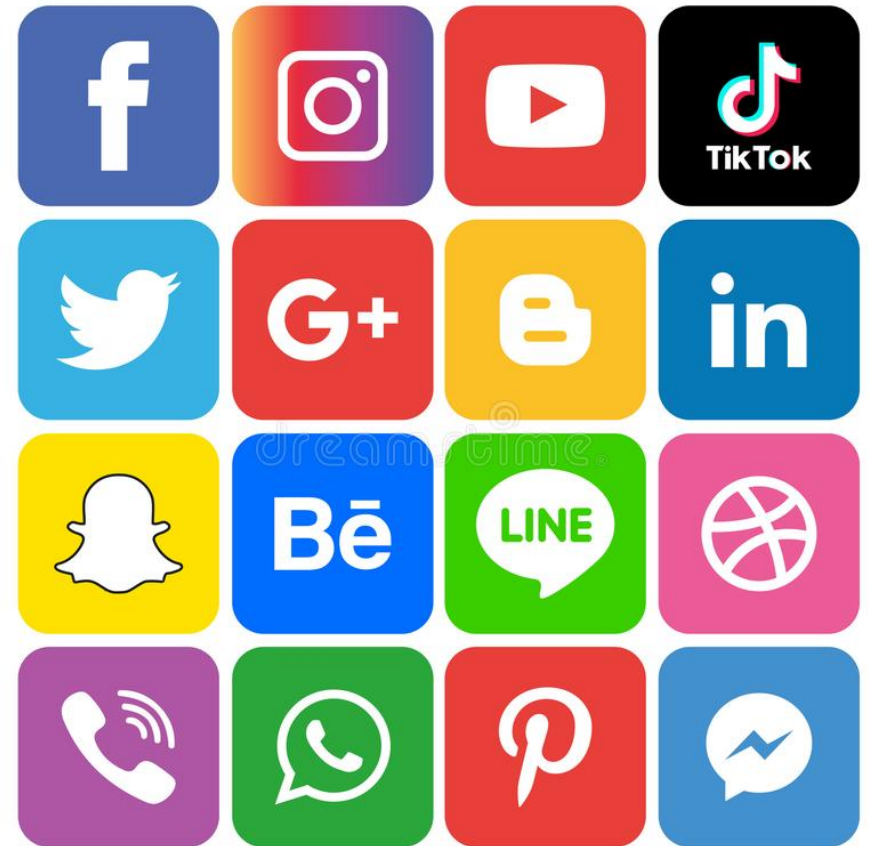


- Hegarty Maths is the number 1

- There are videos covering specific topics and specific target grades.



Steps for Success

- DO find useful pages, sites and accounts for revision
- DO use a mixture of the above as well as 'hard copy' resources
- DO set yourself time slots for the use of all revision resources.
- DON'T use sites/pages/aps which you'll find distracting, keep them for your non-reivison time as a treat.
- DON'T lie to yourself. If you're revising, great, if you're having down time also great but find a balance.
